### Annual General Meeting - May 23, 2018

The most important event of the year is scheduled to begin at 4:00 PM on Wednesday, May 23, 2018. The STA AGM will take place, as usual, at the Bombay Banquet Hall located at 7475 135 St. (across from Costco) in Surrey. Please do not park at Costco!

During this meeting, many important decisions are made for the upcoming school year. In addition to adopting the budget and setting the STA membership fee, elections for the Table Officer positions and other members of the Executive Committee take place.

Hard-copy information packages (please see attached) will be sent to every school site in limited numbers. It will contain the agenda, minutes of previous meetings, some proposed amendments to our By-Laws, a proposed budget for 2018-19, and candidates' statements for our Executive Committee elections. We ask that you place the hard copies in your staff room or other locations in your school (e.g. by the sign-in book) where they can be seen by your staff. More hard copies will be available at the meeting.

The evening will close with the always popular International Pro-D draw, where four grants of \$2,500 are awarded. Remember, you must physically be present at 6:00 PM in order to win if your name is drawn!

#### **Highlights from STA Convention**

Thank you to all the teacher volunteers, organizers, presenters, committee members, and coordinators who helped to make #STACONVENTION2018 such a success! This event would literally not be possible without you and we, your colleagues, are so grateful for the many hours of hard work you put in on our behalf.

This year, Convention's 150+ workshops were spread out across four sites, each one with its own focus. The Aboriginal strand of convention kicked off with a traditional Grand Entry, drumming the entire group of 300+ teachers into the gym at Earl Marriott. There's a video on our Facebook group if you weren't able to be there, but want to check it out. Attendees were treated to a few traditional songs, with a brief explanation as to their purpose and significance before Semiahmoo First Nation Chief Harley Chappell welcomed us to the territory.


When speaking with a couple of teachers afterward, they said that the Grand Entry experience was very powerful. They loved the drums and the singing. "Being part of something like this helps us to feel connected. It brings us together, and makes us feel like we're part of something bigger", one said.

Charlie Demers was the keynote at the other three sites (Primary, Intermediate, Secondary). The presentation focused on childhood trauma, a heavy topic, but addressed issues and shared information through personal anecdotes interspersed with jokes and humour. To say that teachers LOVED it would be an understatement! Some takeaways from the keynote include:

- Know that childhood trauma can have an impact many years after the fact.
- Just because the child didn't experience the trauma while in your classroom (or while being your student) doesn't meant that they won't process it, or be affected by it while in your classroom.
- We don't know when the trauma is going to manifest.
- When a child is acting out or misbehaving, it is so rarely about us.
- Teachers need to help advocate for the kids, and it's important to try to be aware of what's going on (outside of the class).
- Front line people (teachers + others) are being impacted by vicarious trauma.
- Mental health is important! Take care of your mental health so you can help support others!

After the keynote, many teachers lined up to speak with Charlie. Some simply wanted to say thanks, others to make connections and share their personal anecdotes. The presentation was very well received, with teachers saying things like, "This was the best keynote I've ever attended!! (And I've been to a lot!)" "It was good to laugh a little, we needed that! Especially at this point in the year." "Amazing + funny! Loved the joke about being from Newton!" "It was full range! An excellent balance of serious and funny. The joke about the Union made everyone laugh." "It was a really powerful presentation. I was touched and saddened, and even cried! But then the reality was balanced out with some comedy, and I laughed. Really good job of lightening a very serious topic with comic relief."

If you had the opportunity to attend an excellent workshop, I would love to hear about it! I managed to connect with a few teachers during the day on Friday, but would really love to speak with more people, and share some of the wonderful highlights from #STACONVENTION2018. #### Scholarship Opportunity for Surrey Students

Teachers, please share the following opportunity with your Surrey students! The deadline to apply for the Jennifer Wadge Memorial Social Justice Award is May 25, 2018. The application form is accessible **ONLINE**.

Jennifer Wadge was the President of the Surrey Teachers' Association from 2012 until her untimely death in 2015. She was a graduate of Surrey public schools and taught at a number of elementary schools in Surrey. She was a dedicated and passionate supporter of teachers and students, championed social activism, and believed wholeheartedly in the importance of an adequately funded public education system. She was known for her clear thinking, her articulate incisive views, her composed demeanour, and her passion for the issues. Jennifer was deeply committed to the principles of social justice, seeing them as a cornerstone of our work an equitable society.

The STA annually bestows four social justice awards of \$2,000 to successful applicants attending schools in the Surrey School District. It is not necessary to have taken Social Justice 12 to qualify for the award.

The following are the criteria to be used in selecting successful candidates for the social justice award:

- Grade 12 student who will be graduating in 2017 from a school in the Surrey School District, with submission of an official transcript
- Proof of acceptance to a post-secondary institution OR registration in a national/international conference on social justice issues OR an internship in a social justice organization
- School and community involvement in a variety of social justice areas
- Evidence of leadership and/or personal initiative in activities or in an organization relating to social justice
- Statement of commitment to social justice
- Minimum of three sealed confidential references, preferably from a variety of sources. References by family members or friends will not be accepted
- Geographical representation from different areas of the school district.

#### Ramadan: Ideas to Consider

The start of Ramadan is approaching soon (May 15, 2018) and you may have students who will be fasting. Ramadan is a time for spiritual purification achieved through fasting, self-sacrifice and prayers. Remember that students will be fasting long hours before sunrise till sunset (no food or water) and they probably will be on little sleep, so please be mindful of that. Ramadan ends around June 15.

Here are some ways to help students (some of these were suggested by Muslim students):

- Consider opening up your room for students during lunch
- Allow students to walk during PE instead of running
- Students staying after school may need a place to pray provide them that space
- Female students don't fast when they are on their menstrual cycle some female students will not be okay sharing that information
- There will be some students who will be tempted to break their fast or they will break their fast just encourage them and don't call them out for it.
- They may fall asleep in your class don't send them to time out or detention.
- Think about a possible take-home exam they can do
- We are supposed to refrain from listening to music play instrumental music in class if necessary
- Don't pass out candy/food in class
- Provide an alternative place (time out room) for students if they can't focus.
- Some girls will start with their hijabs be a support for them
- Keep in mind of students' comfort level when asking questions related to Ramadan/Islam in front of the entire class.
