

How is information turned into knowledge? Under what conditions do people learn? What is the role of education in the development of societies? In 2008, The Globe & Mail named Lauryn as the first of Ten Canadians to Watch in 2009. She holds a BA in international development (McGill University), an MA in human security (Royal Roads University) and a PhD in language and literacy education (University of British Columbia). She has taught graduate students at the School of Humanitarian Studies at Royal Roads University since 2014.

BC Multiculturalism and Anti-Racism Awards

On March 21, International Day for Elimination of Racial Discrimination, the Government of BC will recognize the outstanding citizens who are promoting multiculturalism and anti-racism. You are encouraged to nominate champions whose exceptional work in their communities promotes inclusion and reduces barriers, to allow everyone to participate fully in the social, economic, cultural and political life of the province.

Nominations are open until **February 22, 2019**, in four categories: individual, organization, youth, and business. The youth category will include a \$5,000 award to a non-profit organization of the recipient's choosing.

NEB Decision Day of Action: No Trudeau Pipeline Expansion!



On Friday, February 22 from 4:30 pm - 6:30 pm there will be a march organized by Climate Convergence starting from the National Energy Board (NEB) Vancouver Office (800 Burrard St @ Robson St.) and ending at the CBC Building (700 Hamilton @ Georgia), concluding with a rally. According to the world's climate scientists, we only have 12 years to reduce carbon emissions and save ourselves from facing catastrophic consequences. February 22 is the deadline for the NEB's report on its review of the marine impact of the Trans Mountain Expansion Pipeline. Surrey teachers are planning to go and stand together in solidarity, demanding a better future for ourselves and our children.

This year the NEVR (Network to End Violence in Relationships) "One Billion Rising" event, co-sponsored by members Mustang Justice and Kwantlen Polytechnic University (KPU), will take place on February 21st from 12:30 pm to 3 pm at LA Matheson Secondary School (9484 122 St, Surrey, BC). One Billion Rising is the biggest mass action to end violence against women in human history. The campaign, launched on Valentine's Day 2012, began as a call to action based on the staggering statistic that 1 in 3 women on the planet will be beaten or raped during her lifetime. With the world population at 7 billion, this adds up to more than ONE BILLION WOMEN AND GIRLS." In attendance will be over 200 students plus members of the public. Call for Proposals: UBC IOP Conference

The UBC Faculty of Education is inviting educators to submit a proposal to present at the 22nd Annual Investigating Our Practices IOP Conference, taking place on Saturday, May 4, 2019. The theme of the 2019 IOP Conference is Being in the World as an Educator, including the following sub-themes: assessment and reporting practices, new curriculum practices, inclusive education practices, mentoring practices, mental health, into teaching learning, practicing teacher research, inquiry as a method of teaching, including Indigenous education practices, social and emotional learning, and student learning. Practicing education professionals and students will come together to share their questions, investigations, and understandings about their practice.


The online <u>Call for Proposals</u> is now open, and closes on Sunday, March 3, 2019. Proposals are invited in three formats:

- Submit a proposal for an individual or group session: challenging, relevant, interactive presentations that showcase how you have been investigating some dimension of the teaching practice. Session time should be divided equally between provoking discussion by providing access to your understandings, and providing opportunity for others to discuss your conclusions.
- Host a roundtable discussion: you have a critical question you would like to discuss with other practitioners and you are willing to initiate and moderate a conversation, perhaps based on your own experience or research.
- Prepare a poster session: ideal for the visual presentation of research results, a program of research, or research activities of a group.

Race Rocks Live

On Tuesday, February 26, join a live stream from Race Rocks, an ecological reserve located off Southern Vancouver Island, British Columbia. Students will hear traditional stories from the T'Sou-ke Nation, learn about our interconnected relationships with our environment, effects of underwater noise and current research on how to reduce impacts.

On Friday March 1st, join a live stream from the Steller sea lion enclosure at the Vancouver Aquarium. Students will connect in real-time with the Marine Mammal Rescue & Rehabilitation team to explore the impacts of ocean plastics and sea lion entanglement, getting a behind-the-scenes look at where they rescue 100 animals per year.

My Name Was January



"January Marie Lapuz was a transgender woman of colour who was murdered in September 2012 in New Westminster, British Columbia. She was an advocate for trans rights and was known as the "bright light" among Vancouver's LGBTQ community. This documentary feature film is a celebration of January's life, among other trans women of colour. This film is about remembering the impact that January had on the lives of everyone she encountered."

The Metro Vancouver Premiere of the multiple international award-winning local indie doc, My Name Was January, will be held at SFU Surrey in the Westminster Savings Lecture Theatre (Room 2600) on Thursday, February 28, 2019.
